Fundamental to all governments is a need to cooperate and plan for long- and short-term needs. As a sovereign tribal government, San Manuel works closely with all levels of government, from local to federal, addressing shared needs for responsive emergency services, public safety, and transportation planning and management. Locally, the Tribe and the city maintain an intergovernmental agreement enabling enhanced San Bernardino Police Department (SBPD) services in the communities surrounding the Reservation. These services include



increased regular patrols and making more officers available in and around the neighborhoods surrounding the Reservation, as well as major thoroughfares, to maintain traffic flow.

In response to mapping software directing drivers to enter neighborhoods instead of using Victoria Avenue, a greater level of coordination is occurring, with SBPD officers deployed and electronic signs provided by San Manuel to Orange street and Highland Avenue to reinforce the use of Victoria Avenue.

On Fridays, Saturdays, and other select days, SBPD officers will encourage non-residents to avoid the residential areas by limiting access from Citrus Street and Mirada Road to Victoria Avenue if required. These measures are in addition to officers regularly positioned at the intersection of Highland and Victoria avenues.

In the long term, the California Department of Transportation is studying a project to build a direct off-ramp from the 210 Freeway onto Victoria Avenue and project alternatives. Such a project is proposed by the city of Highland and supported by San Manuel.

INVESTING in Emergency Services and Growth



Earlier this fall, the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District broke ground on Fire Station 226 in the Del Rosa area and serving the city of San Bernardino.

The new 9,867-square-foot station at 1920 N. Del Rosa replaces an older building in need of replacement. It is made possible in part by a \$3.5 million contribution by the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians as part of an agreement between the Tribe and County for emergency services mutual aid.

The San Manuel Fire Department, which stands among the top 1% of fire departments nationwide, not only protects the Reservation but also aids neighboring cities and statewide when needed. Since 2003, the Department has handled nearly 50,000 calls, with 35% of those calls off the San Manuel Reservation.

To maintain interagency partnerships and overall readiness, the Fire Department and San Manuel Office of Emergency Management regularly consult and develop plans with local and regional emergency services agencies to prepare for major events like wildfires that may require evacuations or sheltering large numbers of people in place.

A high level of interagency cooperation and continued investments in safety infrastructure ensures adequate protection keeps pace with growth as the Tribe, city, and county develop economically and as a population center.
